Repowering London is a not-for-profit community energy development organisation that puts people at the heart of the energy system. We empower communities to plan, fund and build their low-carbon future.

Our mission

We give London's communities the power to create, control and benefit from renewable energy, and play an active part in the transition to a low-carbon society.



The story so far

To date, Repowering London has supported 8 community co-operatives across London to fund, install, and manage rooftop solar projects on social housing estates, schools, and community centres. Our projects generate renewable energy that delivers direct benefits for local people, including cost savings and community investment. They also generate the social energy that brings people together and creates opportunities for communities to flourish.

What we believe

- We believe that people should hold the power when it comes to generating, pricing and using energy.
- We believe that everyone should be able to afford the energy they need and use energy that doesn't harm the planet.
- We believe that coming together around creating local energy creates healthier and happier communities.



Building a pipeline

We are building a pipeline of new community-owned rooftop solar sites across London to help us achieve our goal of tripling London's community-owned solar capacity in the next five years.

In 2022, we completed feasibility studies for 16 new rooftop solar sites across London, with a total capacity of more than 1.1MWp.

Introducing Aldgate Solar Power

ALDGATE

In April 2022 we supported our newest community energy co-operative, <u>Aldgate Solar</u> <u>Power</u>, to install the first community energy project in the City of London. The rooftop solar installation on the Middlesex Street housing estate, in the heart of the City of London, has a total capacity of 37kWp.

We are also pleased to be celebrating the success of this project as Repowering London's first installation since the removal of the Feed-in Tariff. The installation was partially financed by grant funding from the City of London Community Infrastructure Levy Neighbourhood Fund, the Mayor of London's London Community Energy Fund, and M.H. Goldsmith & Sons Limited.

A dedicated team of Aldgate Solar Power volunteers and directors developed and advertised their first community share offer to fund the remainder of the installation costs. They successfully reached their target of £11,300 within two weeks, raising share capital from 34 community investors.

Aldgate Solar Power investors are expected to receive a 3% annual return on their investment, and a Community Fund of £10,250 will be ring-fenced for local causes over the lifetime of the project.

Innovation & infrastructure

The future of urban energy

We are using our collective experience to explore innovative models for providing sustainable and affordable urban energy and driving London's transition to a fair and inclusive low-carbon society.

GreenSCIES

For the Green Smart Community Integrated Energy Systems (GreenSCIES) project, we worked with a consortium of partners to co-design a smart local energy system that reflects the priorities of residents in an Islington neighbourhood. We also presented community investment options for the scheme.

Home monitoring for well-being

We recruited 17 participants on local estates in Lambeth and installed indoor air quality and energy monitoring equipment in their homes to identify opportunities for improvement.

Low-carbon retrofit

Building on our expertise in developing lowcarbon infrastructure projects and engaging communities, we are exploring community-led approaches to retrofitting homes, community buildings and the wider built environment for improved energy efficiency.

In 2022, we partnered with the Greater London Authority and Future Climate to develop a public toolkit for whole-building retrofit in private blocks of flats.

Our work found that private blocks of flats pose unique technical and legal barriers for retrofit. Whole-building retrofit also requires collaboration and consensus between residents, freeholders, and other stakeholders in a block of flats. Community energy expertise – in communication, engagement, governance, and financial mechanisms – can play an important role in overcoming these barriers.

The toolkit we've produced provides guidance and advice for stakeholders exploring the options for their homes and blocks.

We also co-hosted a toolkit launch event for more than 60 retrofit sector stakeholders in October 2022, and conducted retrofit feasibility studies across two pilot sites in South London.

Engaging local communities

Our approach

Collaboration – We create grassroots engagement that drives change from the bottom up.

Empowerment – We create the conditions in which people can exercise agency within their community, their city, and in combatting the climate emergency.

Inclusion – We actively seek to involve the widest range of participants in our mission.

Engagement activities

We facilitate and support community engagement activities ranging from awareness raising and consultation to co-design, movement building, and co-operative empowerment.

In 2022, our team delivered or took part in 74 community engagement activities, including:

- 7 energy advice workshops
- 4 public solar panel making workshops, plus 2 'train the trainers' workshops with coop volunteers
- 3 school workshops or assemblies on climate change and renewable energy
- 2 film screening events
- A Repowering London Family Party for volunteers, directors, and partners across all of our co-operatives and projects

We also conducted 7 focus groups or feedback sessions across 4 projects in 2022, gathering information on stakeholder perspectives and priorities to inform our work.

Our members & volunteers

Mentoring and upskilling

We supported more than 60 co-operative volunteers and directors across 8 co-operatives this year.

Our volunteers and directors received mentoring and training opportunities to develop a variety of new skills:

- Co-operative governance, including holding Annual General Meetings
- Rooftop spotting for local solar sites
- Developing and promoting a successful community share offer

Community capacity-building

A survey of members and volunteers supported across our projects reported increased knowledge, experience, and confidence thanks to their involvement with Repowering London.

Community Leads

In 2022, we employed part-time Community Leads to build engagement across three of our growing cooperatives – Aldgate Solar Power, Lambeth Community Solar, and North Kensington Community Energy.

The Community Leads have brought new energy to these co-operatives and have successfully:

- Built networks with local organisations such as faith groups and food hubs
- Recruited new volunteers and co-operative directors
- Shared energy advice and resources with local residents at community events and centres, including street parties, festivals, and libraries

Education & training

Youth Training Programme

In autumn 2022, Repowering London delivered 10 weeks of paid <u>youth training</u> in North Kensington as part of Notting Dale Future Neighbourhoods 2030.

Participants aged 16–19 were recruited with the help of the local co-operative, North Kensington Community Energy, and each of them received up to 40 hours of training and work experience paid at the London Living Wage.

The course introduced participants to low-carbon technologies and community energy, with core modules including renewable energy, energy efficiency, business models, social media, community engagement, and power and privilege.

Building confidence

Personal changes that participants reported over the course of the programme included "becoming more confident" and "being more sociable".

All of the participants reported improved confidence working in their community and securing work in the environmental sector, with more than two-thirds of participants reporting "good improvement" or "major improvement" in these areas.



ReCreate programme

In winter 2022, we delivered our drama-based programme, <u>ReCreate</u>, for Year 5 students at Bousfield Primary School. The 5-week programme teaches young children about the local and global effects of climate change in an age-appropriate, sensitive and fun way.

We know young people often feel a sense of disempowerment when it comes to the climate crisis. By introducing students to technological and social solutions, and giving them opportunities to learn by doing and discussing, we help them to feel positive about the future and encourage them to create positive change.








Our ripple effect

Participants in our projects – whether local residents, young people, volunteers, or directors – build awareness and skills that they take with them into their personal lives and communities, beyond their involvement with Repowering London. Our work creates wider ripples when these participants change their behaviour, share their knowledge, or build new relationships with their neighbours.



A survey of our members and volunteers also found that involvement with Repowering London was linked to personal behaviour changes. Among respondents who had not taken common energy efficiency actions before they got involved with our projects, a majority went on to take some or all of the actions below after getting involved.





of young people who participated in our Youth Training Programme in autumn 2022 said that they had shared something they learned on the course with a friend or family member.

As one participant told us: "I've been more interested in the energy used at home [and] able to help my mother and brother understand too."

Our projects also build community connections that can extend beyond the life of the project itself. As one participant in an energy innovation pilot project told us: "Usually on council estates it's difficult to know your neighbours, so it is great to be involved in community projects and meet familiar faces."

Strengthening the sector

We regularly share our expertise and experiences with other organisations to build capacity across the climate, co-operative, built environment, and policy sectors. Elevating the voices of lived experience

Repowering London regularly engages with influential stakeholders to elevate the voices of those with lived experience of fuel poverty.

In autumn 2022, we facilitated a workshop that brought together senior Ofgem officials and Lambeth residents. All parties came away with new knowledge and motivations.

Community participants reported feeling respected, valued, and relieved to share their stories. Ofgem participants reported that hearing directly from people brought complexity and detail to high-level statistics and figures. We also share learnings from across our projects to advocate for the perspectives and approaches of people who have experienced fuel poverty.
